

LOVE LETTERS toALABAMA

the ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF TRAIL EXPERIENCE FROM A to Z

If a picture is worth a thousand words, I've got a few pictures for youpictures of love in the form of LOVE LETTERS to Alabama. I've been a travel and leisure writer for over a decade, and first met Alabama seven vears ago. Man, she was something, a true "southern belle," courteous, kind, generous, and oh so beautiful...unforgettable in every good and perfect way—it was love at first, second, and every successive sight. I've written a lot about her the past seven years—some eighty stories and over 140,000 words—on everything I love, and everything I think vou'd love about her too. She loves the outdoors-mountains. lakes, the soft sandy shores of The Gulf-and golf. Boy, does she love golf! She took me on a tour of the world famous Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail—we visited all eleven sites, saw all 26 courses, and played 378 of the 468 holes. It was...wow...pure wow! It's hard to find the words. In fact, it's hard to adequately summarize Alabama's impression on me in general... might even be impossible. But, if you'll oblige me, I'd love to share some highlights on Alabama and the Trail—listed alphabetically from A to Z. Get to know her a little, and I believe you'll love her a lot.»

The famous 2,200-mile **Appalachian Trail** trickles out of Georgia's Chattahoochee National Forest into northeast Alabama where it spills over colorful foothills and into the rivers, lakes, and waterfalls of Talladega National Forest. Where that trail officially stops and starts is open to loose geographical interpretation but, essentially, where the Appalachian Trail ends the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail begins, and the "father of modern golf course architecture" left Alabama residents and guests with an impressive portfolio of golf work that significantly stands out among the rest of the state's standout beauty.

On the southern side of the state, the *Auburn* Marriott Opelika Resort & Spa at **Grand National** is one of the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail's eleven signature sites. Mr. Jones, who designed over 300 courses in 45 states and 29 countries, considered the Grand National property the single greatest golf site he'd ever seen, and built three courses along the shores of the 600-acre Lake Saugahatchee. The Links Course emphasizes challenging fun, with a dozen holes on the water and wetlands. The Lake Course emphasizes beautiful risks, with another eleven holes on the lake and one hole in the lake, the signature 3-par 15th. And the Short Course is a stellar collection of 3-pars just begging for an ace. I was happy to oblige. A popular host hotel for hundreds of annual golf groups, the Marriott features great food and multiple pools not far from Auburn University.

It's spelled all four ways in Alabama and it doesn't really matter which is correct... **Barbecue/ Barbeque/Bar-B-Q/BBQ.** Carnivores sure don't care, we just want to eat the meat, and Alabama's world-class smokers are happy to oblige the masses with massive quantities of perfectly prepared chicken, beef, and pork. My "little black BBQ book" is packed with "finger-licking favorites" like Bob Sykes in Bessemer, and 2014 World BBQ Champion Big Bob Gibson's in Decatur.

Not far from the stellar Bay Barbecue in Mobile, **The Battle House Renaissance Mobile Hotel & Spa** is a unique and historic Marriott with a massive rooftop pool and verandah offering spectacular city and Mobile River views. Treat yourself to a treatment at their fullservice spa, please your palette at any of their three dining establishments, tell secrets to the Whispering Arches, or walk down the street for a bit and a bite at The Blind Mule.

Birmingham is 250 miles north of Mobile and the largest city in Alabama, with a population of roughly 220,000 and the easy-access Shuttleworth International Airport. Many a golf trip on the Trail begins and ends there, and many a mind is blown by some of Birmingham's Best BBQ—the "Meat Three-Peat" at Saw's, Saw's Juke Joint, and Saw's Soul Kitchen.

Almost exactly halfway between Birmingham and Mobile, *Cambrian Ridge* is another stop

on the Trail, with four nine-hole courses, and one of America's most dramatic driving ranges. The three full-length nines — Canyon, Sherling, and Loblolly — are some of the Trail's prettiest and toughest courses, with water everywhere, dramatic elevation changes, and wild green complexes. Super fun as those three nines are, they're scarcely as fun as the Short nine, pinched between a chiseled rock ridge and the shimmering Sherling Lake. I call the property exhaustingly exhilarating. *Golf Digest* calls it "One of America's 40 Best Value" golf facilities.

The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail would not exist without the original vision from **Dr. David G. Bronner**, unquestionably one of golf's greatest pioneers. The former Minnesota native moved to Alabama to move literal mountains, transforming the state into a golf mecca that not only defied all precedents but established one that has never again been matched. The collection of Trail golf-short courses, incredible practice facilities, and championship designs from 4,700 to 8,200 yards-directly benefits the Retirement Systems of Alabama and every golfer of every age and skill level who comes to play. Best of all, the Trail is relatively unaffected by winter, with courses pretty much playable (and snow-free) 365 days, five hours, 48 minutes and 46 seconds a year, and longer on leap years.

America's greatest Short Course may very well be the 13-hole Preserve in Bandon, Oregon, but "America's Greatest Collection of *Executive Courses*" is undoubtedly in Alabama on the Trail. What Robert Trent Jones, Sr. accomplished on his "long" courses is guite commendable. What he accomplished with his incredibly fun short courses is nearly incomprehensible. Mr. Jones built four 18-hole short courses (at Grand National, Hampton Cove, Magnolia Grove, and Oxmoor Valley) and three 9-hole short courses (at Cambrian Ridge, Highland Oaks, and Silver Lakes). In all, that means there is an awesome abbreviated play option at seven of the *Eleven Trail Sites*. Robert Trent Jones, Sr. made quite a splash with these hits. The rest of us make a splash with our misses on them.

It's all about the numbers... these two numbers: **Five Hundred Thousand** and **Four-Hundred-Sixty-Eight**. Five Hundred Thousand golfers visit the Trail each year. Half a million. Each and every year. That number isn't decreasing. If anything, as more people discover the remarkable stay and play and play and play



values, that number is only increasing. The other number—468—that's how many golf holes are on the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail. If you're a master itinerant with a bit of a crazy streak, you can play them, all of them, on one trip. If you're a tad more reasonable, you can cover them in multiple trips. However you go about it, the goal should be the same—"Play them all."

Few spots are more alluring and leisurely rewarding than the Marriott Autograph Collection's *Grand Hotel Golf Resort & Spa* in Point Clear. Featuring 550 acres of boardwalk-lined property directly on Mobile Bay, the resort also offers

indoor and outdoor pools, a water park, spa, fitness center, stunning boardwalk, and 36 holes of Robert Trent Jones Golf across the street at The Lakewood Club. The semi-private Lakewood has two 18-hole championship courses designed by Perry Maxwell that joined the Trail in 2005. The courses alternate between member and public play daily, and while the Azalea Course is a powerful draw, considering it is basically brand new coming off a 2019 renovation, many contend the front nine on the Dogwood Course is one of the Trail's five best nines. **NOTE:** The Lakewood Club hosts the 59th U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Championship September 12-17, 2020.

In Point Clear, you're only 30 miles southeast of the great Trail golf at Magnolia Grove in Mobile, but you're also only 180 miles southwest of another 36-hole Trail site at *Highland Oaks* in Dothan. Highland Oaks has four nine-hole courses. The Highlands, Magnolia, and Marshwood nines are quite scenic, and the Short nine is quite fun, with daunting water carries and wild greens.

From the southeast to the northeast we go, from Highland Oaks to **Huntsville**. Locally known

as the "Barbecue Capital of Alabama" Huntsville deserves way more credit than that. With fifty BBQ joints in town (on last count)-roughly one stop per 3,900 residents—it seriously merits consideration as the "Barbecue Capital of America." The quantity of offerings is significant, but not more significant than the incredible consistency of the quality. Short of listing all fifty restaurants, I'll say Melvin's Place, Pig N Out, The Chuckwagon, and Boarhog's, all are great places to start. Just do yourself a favor and don't count calories. If you want to count something, count on playing the 54 golf holes at the Trail's Hampton Cove, just 10 miles from Huntsville. The River Course, along the Flint River, is the flattest course on the Trail, without a single bunker. The Highlands Course has tons of dramatic views and elevation changes, with a cool rustic mule barn on No. 5. And the 18-hole Short Course can get pretty wet and wild, with water in play on 11 holes.



The **Ironton Ironworks** were a pair of blast furnaces that operated near the Trail's current Oxmoor Valley site back in the 1860's. While the golf facility wasn't built then, it was built there later, on former mining land, a resourceful conversion by Mr. Jones. Equally resourceful, Alabama is the only state in the U.S. that doesn't have to import any resources to make iron. And golfers can buy irons here. Win, win.

I can't imagine a jury would deliberate much on the greatness of golf in Alabama—the verdict seems unanimously in the state's favor-but I know for certain that all deliberation comes to rest when you meet **The Judge**. Judge and jury meet the executioner on the first tee, where the killer tee shot is easily the most dramatic opening moment in Alabama golf, and the rest of the property doesn't dip in drama much from there. The 1,500-acre Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail site at Capitol Hill sits just outside the state capital, and God pounds his gavel of stunning natural beauty into your head on literally every hole. With three 18-hole courses-Judge, Senator, and Legislator-the 54-hole property peaks and plummets along the Alabama River and adjacent the Montgomery Marriott Prattville Hotela most convenient stay and play partner. The Judge is "U.S. Open host worthy," already challenging without the USGA's help, and featuring 14 holes on the water. The Legislator is tough as well, a bit tighter, and swampier, but not any less entertaining. And the Scottish-Links style Senator is many a player's favorite, more wide-open, but with 160 pot bunkers, and therefore far from a pushover. The Senator hosts the Symetra Tour's Guardian Championship each year, and a Korn Ferry Tour event. The capital city of Alabama may not have as much great BBQ as Huntsville, but it still has spectacular options like Fat Boy's and Urban Cookhouse.

If you were jumping up and down just now, worried that I'd left a great Montgomery BBQ stop off my list, don't worry...I've got it covered. K&J's **Rib Shack** on South Court Street is easily one of Alabama's best meat markets, complete with a chalkboard menu and some of the world's friendliest owners, specializing in amazing ribs, chicken, and Southern sides. Save room for the pound cake, assuming there's some left.

Whatever it is that you **LOVE** most about Alabama, there's no denying that everyone is drawn, in one way or another, to the **Lakes**. The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail has tons of lakes of its own—from Lees Lake adjacent Silver Lakes Golf Course to The Lakewood Club, and lovely lakes on the courses like Lake Saugahatchee at Grand National, Sherling Lake at Cambrian Ridge, and Wheelless Lake at Highland Oaks. Off the Trail, but never far from it, other lakes impress like Guntersville Lake, Lewis Smith Lake, Wheeler Lake, and Lake Martin, with its cool replica of the Plymouth Lighthouse.

It's a little known fact that *Mardi Gras* actually began in Mobile, Alabama. Everyone thinks it began in Louisiana. Not so. In Alabama they refer to it as "Carnival" and it is celebrated here from November to February every year. If you're down here for the real Mardi Gras, you might as well golf and Mobile has a spectacular Trail site at *Magnolia Grove*. With two full-length courses—Falls and Crossings—and a thrilling 18-hole Short course that *Golf Digest* once labeled "The Best Par-3 Course in America" you'll find plenty to celebrate in Mobile. The Falls is the only Par 71 course on the Trail. The Crossings is a popular LPGA Tour host with unique crushed-oyster shell waste

areas and some pretty cool wooden bridges.

Rising from the ashes of a former steel-mine, the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail's **Oxmoor Valley** sits just a few miles outside Birmingham, and just two miles from another Trail site at Renaissance Ross Bridge. Oxmoor Valley features two full-length courses and an 18-hole short course. It's hard to describe The Ridge Course as anything other than "a rollercoaster" given the dramatic 150 feet of elevation changes and turbulent green complexes carved into remarkable limestone structures. The Valley Course is equally moving with more landscape highlights and more water, and the Short Course cleverly lets you use almost every club in the bag, and a camera if you have one along.

Practice more, play better...that's the general rule of thought, and the magnificent spreads of land given to the Trail's **Practice Facilities** show that they were anything but an afterthought in Dr. Bronner's master plan. He didn't just want to grow golf courses, he wanted to grow the game, and the incredible practice areas at Oxmoor Valley (and throughout the Trail) let you work on every aspect of your game on your own, or with help from a highly qualified instructor.

From *Qualified* Instructors to highly Qualified Professionals and Managers at every stop, the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail is one finely tuned, extremely in-sync operation. Few things on the Trail impress more than the consistency in service and attention to detail, both inside the clubhouses and out on the courses. That *Quality* is remarkable to say the least, and commendable on any scale, but especially on one with the *Quantity* of golf facilities, courses, and holes like this one.

The single biggest golf endeavor in the history of the world was the Robert Trent Jones Golf **Trail** — no kidding—a science project of greater proportion and imagination than anything Newton, Bell, or Einstein ever produced individually, or collectively for that matter. Is that an exaggeration? Maybe a little. What isn't an exaggeration is that this project comprised of building 8 facilities and 378 golf holes simultaneously—more than 100 miles of golf course at one time. What did those other geniuses ever achieve on that scale? That's what I thought. Mr. Jones, often referred to as "Trent" so as not to confuse him with the equally famous golfer, Bobby Jones, may have his name all over the courses and the state, but given that he was in his 80's when the work began, he wasn't able to do all the architectural designing alone. His senior project manager, Roger Rulewich, deserves a considerable amount of credit as the man driving all of Trent's architectural plans. The Trail fully expanded to 11 sites, 26 courses and 468 golf holes, and partnered up with eight Marriott Resort hotels to form the world's largest golf resort. All but three of the Trail sites have Marriott (or Renaissance) Hotels onsite or nearby, and every Trail site is conveniently linked via interstate highway. By every conceivable standard, the science project of all science projects was a success—a solid A+—and over 13 million golfers have visited the global attraction so far.

Many, including myself and *Golf Channel's* Matt Ginella, consider the flagship hotel and golf course of the Trail to be the *Renaissance Birmingham Ross Bridge Golf Resort & Spa*. Part of that has to do with the "castle on the hill" appearance. Part of that is the perfectly balanced indoor/outdoor vibes of the place, ideal for couples, families, and individual golfers alike. There isn't a Six Flags theme park in Alabama and they don't really need one. They have



Renaissance Ross Bridge. The Renaissance has multiple pools, a world-class spa, a piano bar at JT's Lounge, fine dining at Brocks, and casual fares and flair at The Clubhouse restaurant. It has a golf course with a mammoth buried under the first fairway (supposedly) and eighteen rollercoasters on the course, each with varying heights of elevation and exhilaration. The beauty of the lakes and waterfalls dwarfs even the 8,191-yard course, and the bow on the gift of the experience is the bagpiper bidding adieu to the day at an impressively nearperfect place.

The Renaissance brand is strongly represented elsewhere on the Trail, in both Montgomery and Mobile. The **Renaissance Mobile Riverview Plaza** offers spectacular views of Mobile Bay and the fabulous Harbor Room restaurant not far from the Mobile Convention Center and the Magnolia Grove Trail site. The **Renaissance Montgomery Hotel** & Spa at the Convention Center has a fabulous European-style spa, and a 1,800seat Performing Arts Centre near the Alabama River with shuttle service to the Trail's Capitol Hill site. One of the rare Trail sites without its own Marriott or Renaissance is **Silver Lakes** in Gadsden. Because it appears as if the facility is sort of out there on its own, many people overlook it. Big mistake. Huge. Silver Lakes is a simple drive from Birmingham, Huntsville, and Auburn/Opelika with 36 golf holes from three nines called Heartbreaker. Mindbreaker, and Backbreaker, and my favorite 9-hole short course on the Trail. It's now a wellknown story that Silver Lakes was destroyed by an EF4 tornado in 2011 and Trail management had to decide whether or not to invest in bringing it back. Bring it back they did, bigger and better than ever, and many a Trail guest claims it among their favorite stops. In fact, the only thing more stunning than their comeback story may be the incredible beauty of the property. The place resonates "wow factor."

Another place that resonates wow factor is the Trail site at *The Shoals*. Located in the far northwest corner of the state in Florence and Muscle Shoals, RTJ Shoals has two 18-hole courses only 11.5 miles from the incredible Marriott Shoals Hotel & Spa and those two golf courses are almost surreal. Fighting Joe was the first course built in the United States over 8,000 yards at 8,092, and The Schoolmaster (named after President Woodrow Wilson), with a spectacular setting on the river, might actually be the tougher course.

The gorgeous river I just referenced, that defines many of the golf holes at The Shoals, is the **Tennessee River**, and if you follow that river west a few miles, you'll find the Wilson Dam and beyond that one of the coolest hotels in the South. The Marriott Shoals Hotel & Spa doesn't just sit on and overlook the Tennessee River, it towers over it, with epic panoramic views from Alabama's only rotating restaurant—the 360 Grille—a most luxurious of spa settings, and fun, relaxing hangouts at the indoor pool, outdoor waterpark, and one of my favorite bars anywhere—Swampers. Turns out I'm not alone with those social sentiments. Swampers Bar & Grille features photos and memorabilia from musical celebrities who recorded in Muscle Shoals including Bob Dylan, Otis Redding, and Aretha Franklin. The bar features live music nightly, and you never know who you will see having drinks.



I miss Alabama and the Trail every day. So many great people. So many great values. And speaking of values, few golf packages can touch the value of the Trail's "*Unlimited Golf Specials.*" The seasonal memberships are an absolute steal, considering you can play all you want at 9 of the 11 sites for a remarkably low monthly rate (only Ross Bridge and The Lakewood Club are excluded).

Dr. David Bronner's partner for the massive Trail project was **Vaughan...Bobby Vaughan**. (Think "Bond...James Bond") Vaughn formed SunBelt Golf Corporation to develop, build, and operate the original eight sites and eighteen original courses. Then they added more. And more. And more. Using a baseball analogy, they essentially hit back to back grand slams, which is pretty hard to do. Water Street in Mobile offers easy access to the Port of Mobile, the city's convention center and the Carnival Cruise terminal. Both the Battle House and Renaissance Riverview Plaza are located on this historic street. If you get a craving in Mobile for raw oysters, the original Wintzell's Oyster House is just a few blocks away from both RTJ Resort Collection hotels.

The letter "X" is often used to represent an unknown number. I'd rather deal with the known. The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail is 172,398 walking or riding yards long. The shortest distance between any two sites is 2 miles, from Oxmoor Valley to Ross Bridge, and the longest distance between any two sites is 384 miles, from The Lakewood Club to The Shoals. Full circle you can hit every single Trail site in 1,078 miles. The longest 18-hole course is Ross Bridge, at 8,191 yards from the Tips. The shortest 18-hole course is the Short Course at Grand National, at 1,715 yards from the Teals. Oh, and if you like to watch golf...the Trail has hosted at least one professional golf tournament each of the past 23 years. While Alabama does not have one specific designated nickname, it does have several it answers to including the **Yellowhammer State**—a Yellowhammer being a bird in the bunting family. Others know Alabama as the Cotton State and the Heart of Dixie. I know Alabama as awesome. The state tree is the longleaf pine. The state flower is the camellia. The state capital is Montgomery. The state of being for those visiting is typically one of bliss. And now you know.

All good things must come to an end, unfortunately. I hated leaving Alabama...hated watching her disappear in my rearview mirror. I was tempted to turn around, to run back to her, even move down there so I could forever stay with her. Who knows, maybe I will someday. For now though, I reminisce, and I write love letters like these. I've got a picture of her above my desk, of my son and I standing there with her on the first tee box of The Judge. It really pulls at my heartstrings. I miss you Alabama. In fact, I'm leaving this last letter open...unfinished. I'm convinced there's more to our story. This isn't "goodbye." This is merely "see you later."

Speaking of baseball, Alabama is the home state of some of the game's greatest—mega stars like *Willie Mays* and Hank Aaron, as well as other celebrities like Jesse Owens, Carl Lewis, Bo Jackson, and Channing Tatum (a fact provided a bit too quickly by my wife).

It happens the moment you turn off Scenic Highway 98 in Point Clear, aimed either for The Lakewood Club or, on the other side of the street, the Grand Hotel Golf Resort & Spa — you just feel better. There's something almost magical that takes place and your senses register the change in an instant. You're not just heading toward a golf course, you've turned your vehicle toward a golf destination and a golf experience that enhances every aspect of the game, every amenity it can provide, every challenge, every possibility. You're not just heading toward check-in at a hotel, you're driving toward history, toward beauty, toward comfort, and relaxation the likes of which you haven't previously known. …» Golf's biggest enemy right now is time. People don't have five or six hours (to play). By the time you leave the house and go hit balls, play, have a drink after, it's six hours. That was the idea behind the Experience. It's your first turf experience. Previously, people who went to the practice area would probably wonder, 'Is this what the whole place is going to be like?'

The marriage of The Lakewood Club and the Grand Hotel Golf Resort & Spa is perfect, just perfect. Golfers are caught up in the challenge of the two recently renovated courses, Dogwood and Azalea, and the beauty that engulfs both; guests at The Grand, also recently renovated, are wowed by the historic aspects

of the property, both obvious and hidden, which are wrapped in a layer of contemporary offerings, and there are the views, all those gorgeous views, from the greenery and flowers, to the sunrises and sunsets, to the lushness of the property itself.

To turn onto either road is to turn off the beaten path and enter the Land of Ahhhs. You're able to push the rest of the world aside during your time there and just relax and enjoy all that is in front of you, all that surrounds you.

THE LAKEWOOD CLUB

The drive off Scenic Highway 98 to The Lakewood Club clubhouse is worth the trip. A small road that winds between homes and portions of the Dogwood Course offers an entryway that is serene and creates a sense of anticipation for what lies ahead.

Arriving at the clubhouse, golfers are greeted warmly by attendants who provide warm smiles along with answers to any questions that may arise. Immediately, it is evident the two courses will provide not only a beautiful landscape on which to play, but the challenges one would expect from such a club.

Renovations did not erase the historic nature of the facility, but instead enhanced those qualities. Inside the clubhouse, the historic nature of the club becomes even more evident, though it also features a pro shop, restaurant, and bar that provides state-of-the-art amenities.

The club, part of the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail, lives up to its hype and reputation as one of the Southeast's finest golf facilities.

Before you even step on the first tee of either course, it is obvious you are at special place, a club that offers all that you will require. For most golfers, the day's play begins at The Grand Golf Experience, the practice facility that lives up to its name.

The Experience features three acres of tee surface, 22,000 square feet of greens surfaces, and a two-acre short game area. It is a practice facility that allows you to hit every club in your bag, in every conceivable situation. It also offers world class instruction, club fitting, and modern technology aimed at improving your game.

And that's not all. There's also a 1,500 square foot range house where you can watch golf on a 65-inch TV, have a drink at the full-service bar, have a snack, or simply sit and relax.

Several years ago the practice facility featured only a short hitting area, and you were not allowed to hit drivers because of the short distance available. When the practice area was first moved to its current location, there were challenges there as well.

"They moved the practice facility, but it was never irrigated and didn't drain very well. We tend to get a lot of rain here and when it did, we had to close the range for days because a lot of balls would plug, and we'd end up losing thousands of balls every year. It was just the ground out there," said Niall Fraser, Director of Golf at The Lakewood Club and the former right-hand man for Robert Trent Jones Sr., who designed and built the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail in Alabama for the Retirement Systems of Alabama.

"We put a major investment in there and built what we call The Experience. It's that place where you can hit every shot in the bag, putt on TifEagle greens, work at the short game area, an uneven lie area, and you can get Top 100 instruction and club fitting. And at the end, you can have a drink and watch golf on the 65-inch TV, Wifi is available, music is going, there's a full bar, and you get home in time for soccer practice.

"Golf's biggest enemy right now is time. People don't have five or six hours (to play). By the time you leave the house and go hit balls, play, have a drink after, it's six hours. That was the idea behind The Experience. It's your first turf experience. Previously, people who went to the practice area would probably wonder, 'Is this what the whole place is going to be like?'

"The Experience was to really make this a destination. There are people who don't have time to play but they can practice. We do a lot of groups and night golf. Let's not make it too formal. You have to make the game fun."

The Dogwood Course, renovated in 2005, recently underwent more renovations and improvements that have created a new look and feel to the 7,104-yard, par-72 layout. Reopened in July of 2018, the course will be the site of the 2020 U.S. Senior Women's Amateur championship, one of 14 championship tournaments run by the United States Golf Association.


Those changes included the installation of TifEagle greens, as well as the movement of a few greens and other changes that not only added to the overall improvement of the course, but were aimed at making the course more friendly for the average golfer.

"On Dogwood we didn't do very much. We moved around some bunkers and placed some in front of greens, making it easier for the average golfer. We widened the areas in front of the greens, and we only moved three greens – 14, 16, and 17. We did very little movement in that regard. Changed the fairway grass to a new grass called Celebration. It was really aesthetic things that we changed, trying to pay attention to detail."

Once the renovations to Dogwood were complete, the Azalea Course was closed so it could get a facelift, as well. It reopened on Friday, November 1, 2019, to great anticipation and good reviews from members and guests alike. The changes to Azalea were far more intensive than those to Dogwood.

"First of all, it's a little shorter now from all the tees," Fraser said, "Right out of the shoot was a 650-yard par 5. All the other tees were relative to it. We shortened (the first hole) about 100 yards, but it's still 567 off the back tees. The effort was made to really open up the front of the greens for the average golfer. To really do that there was a strong effort to make it look different.

"Azalea is a big piece of property and with Bermuda grass you don't get a lot of contrast with the grasses. So, we wanted to try and create a different look and did it with grasses. There's a gravel product on 10 and 11, so instead of having pine straw in there and roots under that, we used this gravel product



USGA TOURNAMENT COMING TO LAKEWOOD IN 2020

Of the 16,000 courses across the country, only 14 will host a USGA national championship in 2020. One of those national tournaments will be played on the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail for the first time.

The Lakewood Club's Dogwood Course will play host to the 59th annual U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Championship September 12-17, 2020. It will be just the eighth USGA event ever played in the state of Alabama, the most recent being the 2018 U.S. Women's Open at Shoal Creek in Birmingham.

"There has never been a USGA event on the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail," said Niall Fraser, Lakewood's Director of Golf. "We have hosted the PGA TOUR, LPGA, and others, but never USGA events." Fraser explained such tournaments are usually hosted at private clubs such as Pebble Beach or Pinehurst.

"The marriage of the U.S. Senior Women's Amateur and The Lakewood Club is a perfect fit based on the competitive challenge presented by the Dogwood Course, as well as the beauty, ambiance, and amenities available at the Grand Hotel," said Fraser. He noted that the spa, nearby shops, the proximity to Fairhope and its quaintness, the restaurants available at the Grand Hotel, the beauty of the area and the history, makes it a great location for the U.S. Senior Women's Amateur.

The tournament will feature a field of 132 players, 50 years old or older, with a handicap index of 14.4 or better. Golfers will earn their place in the field via qualifying tournaments held across the country or via an exemption category.

The first two rounds of the tournament will feature stroke play. After the stroke play aspect of the tournament has been completed, the low 64 players will advance to match play. There will be six rounds of match play that will end with the crowning of the U.S. Senior Women's Amateur champion for 2020.

"We are very excited to bring the 59th U.S. Senior Women's Amateur to The Lakewood Club," said John Bodenhamer, USGA Senior Managing Director of Championships, in announcing the club's selection. "We are confident that its Dogwood Course will provide the ultimate test for competitors as well as a championship experience outside the ropes."



which gives a very neat and tight lie, and you can always get out. It's very clean and consistent and has a good look to it. We used a fairway grass and, on the tee, called Latitude, a new Bermuda grass that's come out. It's a different shade of green, more of a lime green. What that does is it gives us a little contrast like what the northern courses have. You can tell where the fairway is and where the different areas are, the color of the rough and the greens are different. We used five different grasses to create that look. It appeals to the eye and makes it look different."

Other changes include a revamping of the course's former signature hole, No. 14, which originally featured an island green. The hole still plays to a strong degree of difficulty, but the island green has been eliminated, a move made to aid the average golfer. Between hole No. 9 and hole No. 10, which sits in a low area that featured a lot of empty space, now sits a three-acre pond.

"It takes away from all that green – I think it was 230 yards wide and it was just all green," Fraser said. "Now it's 90-100 yards worth of water and 100 yards worth of green."

Other changes included the moving of 12 of the course's 18 greens, again to make the course more appealing and playable for the average golfer.

"We kept the same green surfaces but took a little of the pitch out of them," Fraser said. "They are TifEagle greens, so you can't have a lot of pitch because they are so fast the ball would just go right off the green. We centered them more to get more sun and we took out some trees. They are smaller, but they have very little movement in them. We did some different things with that. discovering the wonder and enchantment it offers. Even those who have been with the hotel for years enjoy its qualities day after day, year after year.

"I started working here in the spring of 1986, and that particular year the azaleas were still blooming, and we had wonderfully cool mornings and warm days later," Susan Stein, the hotel's historian, said. "I thought I had died and gone to heaven when I came to work at the hotel. I thought, this is ideal, it's just such a beautiful place to work. There's such a wonderful ambiance here at the hotel between the building, the grounds and the people I work with. I've been here for 33 years, and we have over 40 staff members who have been here at least 25 years.

"It's almost like coming home every day. It just feels good to walk on the property. And we have repeat guests who come back all the time. We have members of Lakewood and the hotel is part of their lifestyle. It's welcoming and warm, and it's gratifying because people appreciate what's here."

Certainly, the changes are worth noting. The hotel is more than 170 years old, and while its history is as much a fabric of the hotel as the actual structure, there are contemporary aspects to the hotel, as well. The two combine to provide guests a relaxing stay, marked by an ever-present feeling of comfort, almost like being at home.

It recently joined the Autograph Collection of hotels, denoting the uniqueness and special qualities that make it the Queen of Southern Resorts.

"The Grand is 170 years in the making," said Kevin Hellmich, Director of Sales and Marketing. "You can't build a hotel like the Grand today. Our guests,

We had two par 3s with two greens, and that was just a novelty. We chose to go back to one green and made them a little bigger. Again, it is a totally different look. And we had big bunkers, so we made bunkers smaller. We opened up the front so the average golfer can run it up to the green."

All the work on both courses, Fraser said, are based not only on creating excellent golf courses, but making those courses a challenge — and more fun — regardless of one's skill set.

"We encourage players to move up (on the tee box)," he said. "We have five sets of tees on either course. It really affects the women and the seniors, so let them go out and have fun. They are great golf courses, and they are both fantastic."

The Lakewood Club has long had a presence as one of the finest golf facilities along the Gulf Coast and the Southeast in general. The recent renovations have only enhanced that standing, and Fraser said the leadership of Dr. Bronner and the RSA has allowed the improvements to be made.

THE GRAND HOTEL

A total of 405 rooms are available at The Grand, an AAA Four Diamond-rated hotel, featuring three different designs, not counting suites, in five buildings — South Bay, North Bay, Marina House, Spa Building, and the Main Historic Building. The staff, at every area of the hotel, is prompt, courteous, and friendly, offering great service.

The hotel sits on 550 acres where giant, live oaks are numerous, not to mention an amazing assortment of greenery and flowers that show off nature at its best. The nearby marina welcomes boats from Mobile Bay and the Gulf of Mexico and ducks travel freely on the property, adding to its atmosphere and beauty.

The magic of The Grand is its simplicity. There is so much to do, so much to see, so much to experience. When you arrive, you fall under its spell right away, and soon you are acutely aware you have spent much of your time smiling.







ALABAMA'S INTERNATIONAL ARTIST BY LENORE VICKREY, ALABAMA LIVING MAGAZINE

Few Alabamians are known by only one name, but then very few can command the international reputation of the artist Nall. Born Fred Nall Hollis in Troy in 1948, he has been creating art in a variety of genres for more than 50 years, from paintings, mosaics, and line engravings to sculpture, glassware, and jewelry. He grew up in Troy and earned a degree in art, political science, and abnormal psychology from the University of Alabama. He studied at the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris and was mentored by Salvador Dali. His work has been exhibited in France, Italy, Switzerland, New York, Miami, and many other museums, and he has been an artist in residence at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, Miami-Dade College, and Troy University. After living several years in France and setting up his N.A.L.L. Art Foundation for students, he returned to Alabama, where he now operates out of his studio in Fairhope. He has a permanent art gallery in the International Arts Center on the Troy campus.

Your work is well known to many Alabamians who've seen it in the hotels and properties of the Retirement Systems of Alabama. Do you still supply new artwork to the RSA hotels and buildings?

Working with the RSA has been a great part of my career. It gives you a lot of exposure. People go to luxury hotels much more than they go to museums. I met Dr. David G. Bronner (CEO of the Retirement Systems of Alabama) through (Troy University Chancellor) Jack and Janice Hawkins. It's all like a family. They're wonderful, super people. I did all the pieces at the Grand Hotel, and loaned them in 2002 when they did a major renovation. Having completed a massive transformation in 2018, they gave back 1,500 pieces of my art, so now when I go to someone's home I take a little piece of art instead of a bottle of wine. Everybody won! For the Grand's transformation, the resort added a Nall Suite and a connecting gallery overlooking the historic main lobby. I also created large camellia prints for the reception desk wall. Other new pieces are in guest rooms and other locations throughout the resort.

At your studio in Fairhope, do you still work with apprentices?

I'm still working with them, using a lot of students from the high school mostly. Every now and then I'll get one who wants to apprentice for three or four months. That's what I'm looking for. They're helping me, and that is learning (for them) because they're in a professional environment. We paint and frame, learn about inventories, giving interviews with the press, how to make yourself available. I'm teaching them everything I know about everything. How to be a teacher is taught in school. How to be an artist is not. There's a world of difference. First of all, you can't count on any income when you're 65. That's essential to know when you want to become an artist. You follow your own rules, and express from your heart, not your intellect.

You've worked in so many different media. Do you have a favorite?

All are my favorite at the time I'm working on them. When I'm working, I'm so concentrated on that, it's absorbing. I have a wonderful ability to have a one-track mind on whatever I'm doing. I can be working and talking on the phone and doing something else at the same time, and still be right there with the work. It's a gift.


Frames have been an important part of your signature look.

Absolutely. It's the framework on the pieces that really makes some of them. Whatever you see, you see the framework with it. So, if you put an 18th century gilded frame around a drawing, the drawings are going to look a heck of a lot better. And if you put a drawing or little painting with tacky little frames, you wouldn't want it. It's an important thing I try to teach my kids. What you're giving the public is an image. The image is inseparable from the frame around it. If you want to have a filthy house with the bed unmade and the curtains ragged and falling down, the house might be great but people who are going into the house will say, "This is awful." It's the same thing with a painting or somebody's clothes.

What are your current projects?

I've got three books going on. It's wonderful to be able to change and concentrate on something else. The N.A.L.L. Foundation is going to publish my memoirs. Plus, I'm building a museum down here in Fairhope. I've been told by a spiritual advisor that if you write your memoirs, it's the best way to increase your memory. If I'd known that, I'd have started them 10 years ago.



PROFESSIONAL PLAY

Lexi Thompson had her first professional win here. So did Aria Jutanugarn. Lorena Ochoa won here twice. Scott Piercey, Aaron Baddeley, and Grayson Murray all won PGA TOUR events along the Trail. For the past 23 years, professional golf has been played along Alabama's Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail and this tradition continues in 2020.

Prattville's Capitol Hill has been a favorite along the RTJ Golf Trail to many professional golfers. In 2019, RTJ Capitol Hill was the only location in North America to host men's and women's professional golf events on the same course. The Web.com Tour (now Korn Ferry Tour) played the Senator Course in April, and the Symetra Tour returned to the Senator in September. The Symetra Tour also visited RTJ Grand National in May last year for a tournament hosted by World Golf Hall of Famer Nancy Lopez. A recap of the three professional tournaments played on the Trail in 2019 follows, along with dates for the 2020 tournaments.

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ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF TRAIL CHAMPIONSHIP WEB.COM TOUR (KORN FERRY TOUR) RTJ CAPITOL HILL'S SENATOR COURSE 2019 CHAMPION LANTO GRIFFIN

Trailing by a stroke on the 72nd hole of the tournament, Lanto Griffin (Mount Shasta, California) stuck it to five feet before converting a tying birdie and reach a playoff with Robby Shelton (Wilmer, Alabama) at 15-under 273. After both players made pars on the first three holes of the playoff (18-18-9), Griffin stuck it to two feet for a tap-in birdie and his second career Web.com Tour title.

"You put so much work in and there's so many days and weeks that things don't click," said Griffin. "You wonder if you're going to get back into that situation to have a chance. Just being in contention, I texted my coach last night that I hit it terrible yesterday and my swing felt awful, but my putting came back...I made all of the putts I needed to."

Griffin posted four front-nine birdies at the Senator Course and led by two at one point early, but seven pars and a bogey on the back nine led up to Griffin's dramatic closing birdie to tie. His final-round 68 was his fourth round in the 60s all week, the only player to accomplish the feat at the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail Championship.

The 30-year-old credited legend Vijay Singh with a putting tip on the practice green at TPC Sawgrass to his improved play around the greens. "I was putting on the back green and Vijay yells out to me from 20 yards away and said 'get your right elbow in tighter and bend over more,'" said Griffin. "Of course I said 'yes sir,' and he came over and helped me for a couple of minutes...He told me after that to go win this week, so big shout out to him. That was cool. Especially from a legend. He won nine times in 2004. When a legend like that tells you something, you have to pay attention." The impromptu putting lesson came on Saturday morning during the Masters, a day after Singh missed the cut in Augusta.

Both Lanto Griffin and Robby Shelton earned their PGA TOUR cards for 2020. Griffin went on to win the Houston Open in October 2019. ZIMMER BIOMET CHAMPIONSHIP HOSTED BY NANCY LOPEZ SYMETRA TOUR RTJ GRAND NATIONAL'S LAKE COURSE 2019 CHAMPION NURIA ITURRIOS

A final round 1-under par 71 was enough for Nuria Iturrios (Mallorca, Spain) to clinch a wire-to-wire victory at the inaugural Zimmer Biomet Championship hosted by Nancy Lopez, stepping into the winner's circle for the first time in her Symetra Tour career.

The victory was the latest in a string of success for lturrios over the last month. Within a week between the end of April and early May 2019, the 23-year-old captured back-to-back titles on the Ladies European Tour (LET) in the Lalla Meryem Cup and Omega Dubai Moonlight Classic.

"I guess I like the big purses," Iturrios said laughingly. "It's so good to win again, and I'm so happy with my work from the offseason. I feel great and want to keep going like this. I'm putting really good, and I want to keep enjoying these moments, doing the work to get here."

With the support of LPGA Tour and World Golf Hall of Famer Nancy Lopez, this event featured the largest purse in Symetra Tour history of \$300,000. In turn, it provided the biggest winner's payout ever on the "Road to the LPGA" at \$45,000. "I think it's a really good thing that she helped make this event possible," said lturrios. "Really good for us to have her as an idol and I hope she can help create more events like this. We really enjoyed the tournament and it would be great to win more like this. I have to play like this again with a lot of weeks to go, but my goal is the LPGA Tour as soon as possible."

GUARDIAN CHAMPIONSHIP SYMETRA TOUR RTJ CAPITOL HILL'S SENATOR COURSE 2019 CHAMPION LAURA RESTREPO


Entering the final round of the Guardian Championship in Prattville, Ala., Laura Restrepo (Panama City, Panama) was four shots back. When the dust settled, the University of Louisville alumna had clinched the first professional golf title for her native country Panama and raised the first trophy in her Symetra Tour career.

After shooting bogey-free in the second round for a career-best 6-under par 66, Restrepo followed that with another bogey-free performance of 8-under 64 in the final round from the Senator Course at Capitol Hill on the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail. The overall score of 14-under was good for a one-shot victory.

"It is so amazing, I can't even put it into words," Restrepo said. "This year has been rough, but to have it all come together the last two rounds feels so amazing. All the hard work finally paid off. It has just been tough, missed a lot of cuts out here and haven't been that consistent. I was putting in the work, staying patient. It is tough to do that and stay positive, but I tried my best and this is well worth it."

THE SHOALS FLORENCE/MUSCLE SHOALS » 36 HOLES » OPENED 2004

The Fighting Joe Course at The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail at The Shoals opened August 2004 and was the first Trail course to break 8,000 yards, measuring some 8,092 yards from the black tees. It's long, really long, and this links-style course is simply good, straight-forward golf. You can see where you're going. The question is...can you get there?

Some say the spectacular 17th hole is the signature hole on the course, but the 18th green overlooking Wilson Lake on the Tennessee River will distract you with its beauty, if not its treachery. Travel + Leisure Golf named Fighting Joe one of the top new courses in 2004 for good reason. Long-hitters here will experience a test of champions; but from the correct tee box, all players will enjoy world-class golf.

The second course, the Schoolmaster (named for President Woodrow Wilson who was responsible for getting Wilson Dam built on the river and was known as The Schoolmaster of Politics) opened in the summer of 2005. This tree-lined course is more traditional golf with every hole in keeping with the natural topography along the Tennessee River. It is wooded, rolling, and spectacular.

The Schoolmaster may be a tougher course than Fighting Joe, but only time will tell. One thing's for sure, it's a shot-maker's golf course with narrower fairways, tree-lined greens, and still a length of nearly 8,000 yards! It's hard to beat the beauty that the 18th hole holds on the high bluffs over the river, but the waterfall on the 2nd hole sure comes close. Make sure you've done your homework well, for the Schoolmaster will certainly test all of your skills.

The 2020 Couples Championship is August 28-30 and is limited to the first 56 teams.

ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF COURSE AT THE SHOALS

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HAMPTON COVE HUNTSVILLE » 54 HOLES » OPENED 1992

The Northern gateway to the Trail is Hampton Cove in Huntsville, a 54-hole facility with terrain that drastically changes from one side of the property to the other.

Renovated in 2008, the Highlands Course has been restored to its original Scottish Links design. Long waving grasses frame beautiful rolling terrain and create beautiful golf holes. The finishing holes on the Highlands Course are among the most scenic and challenging on the Trail. One of the most recognizable landmarks on the Trail is the old mule barn beside the fifth hole.

Completely opposite in design is the River Course, the only Robert Trent Jones layout without a single bunker. The River Course is laid out on former soybean fields in the flood plain of the Flint River. The River Course is a throwback to the way courses were built long ago, where dirt was merely pushed up to create the greens and tees, leaving all else, including massive oak trees, as is. With water on 16 of the 18 holes, the River Course will challenge your shot making ability.

The Short Course at Hampton Cove is open and links-like, with water in play on 11 holes. It is a great venue for golfers of all skill levels and alternating tees allow golfers to hit every club in their bag.

Relax in the beauty of Northeast Alabama's stunning landscape as you explore 36 holes of forests, wetlands, grasslands, and dramatic elevation changes. The Heartbreaker, Backbreaker, Mindbreaker, and Short Course provide a challenging and scenic variety of holes to play.

Surrounded by the Appalachian foothills and Lee's Lake, Silver Lakes features the most unique and aptly named courses on the Trail, and all 36 greens boast Champion ultra dwarf putting surfaces.

The Backbreaker features wide fairways, demanding greens, and spectacular views of the surrounding foothills, while the Heartbreaker provides a unique mix of great golf holes and unequaled character with the final three holes showcasing elevation changes and dramatic lake vistas. The Mindbreaker is an unforgettable blend of shorter, elusive holes set in a beautiful sanctuary of woods, water, and wetlands. The Short Course provides a relaxing trip around Lee's Lake and offers magnificent views of surrounding landscape.

ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF COURSE AT SILVER LAKES

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OXMOOR VALLEY BIRMINGHAM » 54 HOLES » OPENED 1992

Centrally located in the state and just minutes from the newly revitalized downtown Birmingham area, this 54-hole facility was built on former mining land owned by U.S. Steel. Sculpted from the peaks and valleys of the Appalachians, the courses offer scenic forests, numerous creeks, and challenging elevation changes.

The Ridge Course offers numerous elevation changes, heavy tree cover, and is incredibly photogenic. As a tribute to the area's mining past, the green at the par-5 3rd hole is buttressed by a shelf of exposed shale rock.

The Valley is considered a more traditional layout, dotted with numerous sand bunkers and picturesque lakes and streams. It stretches two miles downrange along a slender valley. The par-5 12th hole offers the most intimidating of tee shots, with a large lake looming in front of the player, letting the best of golfers bite off as much as they can chew.

The Short Course at Oxmoor Valley is a delightful collection of 18 pure oneshotters. It is listed by *Golf Digest's Places to Play* as one of the nation's Great Value courses in the public category.

ROSS BRIDGE HOOVER » 18 HOLES » OPENED 2005

Beautifully carved into the rolling terrain of Shannon Valley, these 18 holes will challenge even the best golfers. Ross Bridge was named one of the top golf resorts in North America by *GOLF* magazine in 2019 and has been a favorite of *Golf Digest* editors for the past four years.

The course meanders through indigenous landscape and around the 259-room Renaissance Birmingham Ross Bridge Golf Resort & Spa. Ross Bridge is the fifth longest course in the world but offers multiple tees for golfers of all levels. Symbolic of an old parkland style course, ten holes play along the banks of two significant lakes connected by a spectacular waterfall dropping 80 feet between the 9th and 18th greens. A gristmill added to the waterfall reflects the history of this old mining site. The beauty and challenge of each hole leads many to believe there is not one signature hole but possibly eighteen.

Like many other Trail courses, the par-three holes are incredible. Considerable elevation changes combine with water or other natural obstructions to get your attention. Large putting surfaces provide many tempting pin locations that will test golfers' approach shots.

Number 17, a long par 4, plays to a small, well-guarded green. Water frames the right side of this down-sloping hole. In the background is a picturesque view of the 9th and 18th holes with the waterfall tumbling between. The 7th hole offers a par five that traverses a ridge high above the rest of the course. The 9th will leave you speechless as it is time to decide how daring you are off the tee. A split fairway allows for either a short challenging route along the water's edge or opt for safer play leaving a longer, more difficult approach to the green. Regardless if it is a par three, four, or five, Ross Bridge stands ready for your game!

ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF COURSE AT ROSS BRIDGE

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GRAND NATIONAL AUBURN/OPELIKA » 54 HOLES » OPENED 1992

Both the Links Course and the Lake Course were in the top 10 of *Golf Digest's* list of "America's Top 50 Affordable Courses," and all three courses at Grand National are listed among the nation's 40 Super Value courses by *Golf Digest's* "Places to Play." Grand National, by all reports, was the single greatest site for a golf complex Robert Trent Jones, Sr. had ever seen. Grand National is built on 600acre Lake Saugahatchee with 32 of the 54 holes draped along its filigreed shores.

Named a favorite golf resort by the *Golf Digest* editors for the past four years, the cornerstone of the complex is the Links Course, which is without a single weakness. The par-4 18th is without a doubt the strongest finishing hole on the Trail. The drive must carry a corner of the lake, while the approach is played to a shallow pedestal green shored up by boulders.

With 12 holes hugging the shore, Grand National's Lake Course is every bit as scenic as the Links. Not only is the quartet of par threes on the Lake Course as good as any in the nation, the 230-yard, island green 15th may be the single prettiest hole on the Trail. The Lake course hosted PGA TOUR events in previous years and welcomes back the Symetra Tour in May.

The Short Course, while overshadowed by the two main tracts, is a thing of beauty, with more than half the holes touching the lake. This 18-hole course of one-shotters might be the finest anywhere in the country.

The 2020 Couples Classic will be October 30-November 1 and will be limited to the first 96 teams.

National Village, a golfing community on the Trail, is adjacent to these courses and the Marriott Resort.

CAPITOL HILL PRATTVILLE » 54 HOLES » OPENED 1999

Named the #2 public golf site in the country by *Golf World* readers, Capitol Hill in Prattville continues to get praises from golfers and golf writers alike. *Golf* magazine called the Judge Course one of the 10 public courses in America worthy of hosting the U.S. Open and the *Zagat* Survey of America's Top Golf Courses ranked it among the top 50 courses in America. The Senator was named among the Top 10 New Courses in the nation by *Golf* magazine and hosts the Symetra Tour's Guardian Championship in September.

Located in Prattville, approximately 8 miles north of Alabama's state capitol, Capitol Hill features three 18-hole championship courses. With more than 1,500 acres of golf and nature, the pure magnitude of this facility is amazing and allows each course to be drastically different from the others.

The Senator, a Scottish-Links style course holds more than 160 pot-hole bunkers and mounds 20 to 40 feet in height, hiding the cart path or any other hole from the fairway. The Senator Course will be closed from mid-April through September while TifEagle Ultradwarf greens are installed.

The Legislator, a more traditional course, plays in and out of pine trees and along the bluff. The view riding down the "Sky Bridge" for six holes laid out in a native cypress swamp will impress as you are led back up the bluff to finish the course at the spectacular clubhouse.

The Judge offers stunning vistas along the 200-acre backwaters of the Alabama River. The first tee lies 200 feet above the fairway overlooking the river and the Montgomery skyline. With 14 holes adjoining the water and a bulkhead island green, the Judge is described as simply magnificent.

Capitol Hill also features an innovative circular driving range 400 yards in diameter.

ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF COURSE AT CAPITOL HILL

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CAMBRIAN RIDGE GREENVILLE » 36 HOLES » OPENED 1993

Known by avid golfers as one of the most beautiful and most challenging stops on the Trail, Cambrian Ridge in Greenville lies just 40 miles from Montgomery. It is well worth the ride for any golfer looking for 36 holes of jaw-dropping golf.

Since being named by *Golf Digest* as the third best new public course in America in 1994, Cambrian Ridge has not rested on its laurels. 2016 saw the culmination of a three-year total renovation of the original 27 championship holes set upon the most spectacular setting for golf in the state of Alabama. The Loblolly and Sherling nines were completed in 2013 and 2014. The Canyon nine redesign and reconstruction were completed in 2016. The greens themselves have been redesigned to accommodate the higher greens speeds associated with our installation of the latest-generation of ultra-dwarf Bermuda grass. However, this major renovation did not stop with the new greens. Many of the holes have been totally redesigned to open up views of Sherling Lake, deliver a challenging test of golf while providing players of all skill levels a variety of ways to play each hole and enjoy the experience.

This year on Memorial Day weekend, May 23-24, Cambrian Ridge will host the annual Father/Son Championship, one of the most popular events on the Trail.

HIGHLAND OAKS Dothan » 36 Holes » Opened 1993

Located in the southeast corner of Alabama, Highland Oaks offers three nine-hole championship courses. The Highlands/Magnolia combination was named by *Golf Digest's* "Places to Play" as one of the nation's Great Value courses. This 36-hole complex features some of the longest and most classically designed holes on the Trail. Each nine has a different personality. Highlands, the core nine, is relatively open with several lakes in play. The peninsula green at the par-3 6th has an elusive, beckoning quality.

Marshwood has been made famous (or notorious) by its behemoth par-5 6th, which stretches to 701 yards from the tips. The 422-yard par-4 9th, a left to right dogleg, is arguably the best hole at the site and has a tilted green elevated above a swathe of wetlands. The Magnolia nine is well-named: specimen magnolia trees dot the higher ground, which is reached via a 1,000-foot long wooden bridge spanning a marsh filled with lichen-dappled trees. The feature hole is the 416-yard 5th, where a split-level fairway offers an option off the tee. The Short Course, a nine-hole par 3, has demanding bunker placements, three water holes, and possibly the best putting Bermuda greens in the South.

TifEagle Ultradwarf greens are being added nine holes at a time. This project will be complete in 2020.

ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF COURSE AT HIGHLAND OAKS

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MAGNOLIA GROVE MOBILE » 54 HOLES » OPENED 1992

The new Magnolia Grove features two renovated golf courses. Each championship course received extensive renovations in the past three years. Golfers will find more "player friendly" qualities without compromising the integrity of Robert Trent Jones' original design.

Magnolia Grove, the most southern location on Alabama's Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail, was recently named one of the "Top 50 Public Courses" by *Golf World Magazine* readers. The Crossings and Falls courses are also listed in *Golf Digest's* "Places to Play" as two of the nation's Great Value courses and as "America's Top 50 Affordable Courses."

The topography at Magnolia Grove features creeks, marshland, and lakes with each of the 54 holes carved through indigenous hardwood and pine. The new Crossings Course, which has hosted the LPGA Tour, provides an open parkland type ambiance. Several water features and crushed oyster shell waste areas were added to provide an exciting new look. All 18 greens have been redesigned and planted with the newly acclaimed Mini Verde Ultradwarf Bermuda grass.

The renovated Falls Course reopened in October 2010 as the only par-71 golf course on the Trail. The main tract at Magnolia Grove is characterized by large, liberally contoured Mini Verde greens and massive cloverleaf bunkers. Several holes were entirely redesigned giving the course a brand new look.

Golf Digest named the Short Course at Magnolia Grove as the best par-3 course in America. The Short Course, also recently renovated, features several newly designed greens and all new putting surfaces with the acclaimed Champion Ultradwarf Bermuda grass. This course is as good as any collection of one-shotters on a championship course.

The Couples Challenge will be held April 24-26, 2020.


